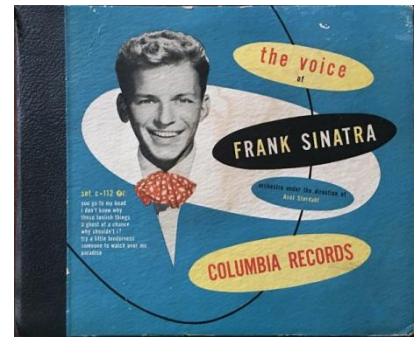

This release is known with four inside back covers. These inner covers were released in the following order:

1. The second cover in the first column is C-54, *Rhumba With Cugat*. At the bottom is a list of Columbia's prices.
2. The second cover in the first column is C-54, as above. There is a sticker over the prices, indicating that they have gone up.
3. The second cover in the first column is C-110; the bottom cover in the first column is C-19. The prices have been replaced with a description of Columbia's lamination process.
4. The second cover in the first column is C-110; the bottom cover in the first column is C-112. The prices have been replaced with a description of Columbia's lamination process.



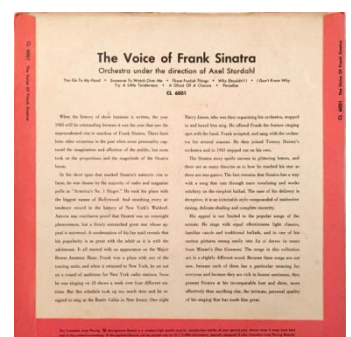
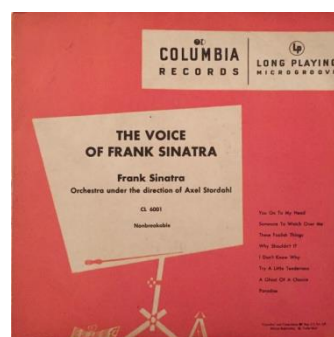
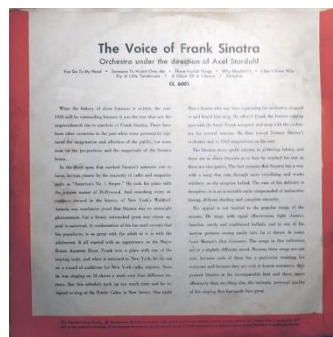
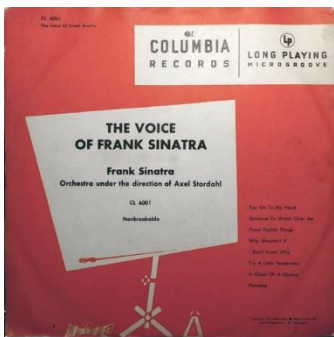
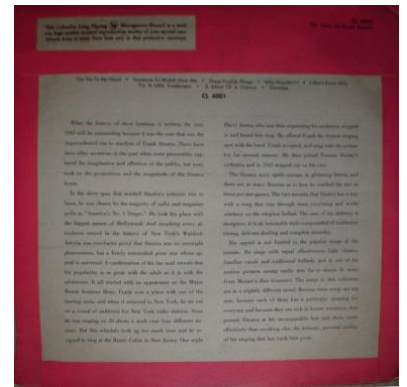
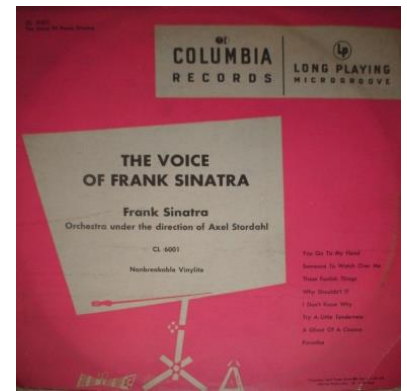

The cover is a paper envelope that opens from the top. The first cover has the word "vinylite" on the front, after "nonbreakable." These covers open with a flap. The second cover has no flap, and the word "vinylite" is absent. The second cover has the title printed in black on the front, in the upper left, as the first cover does; the third cover does not have the title in that place, but the title appears on the back in black along the sides.

The earliest labels have "microgroove" underneath "long playing" and have a large LP logo at the bottom right. There are two lines of rim text. This label appears to have stopped in September, 1948.

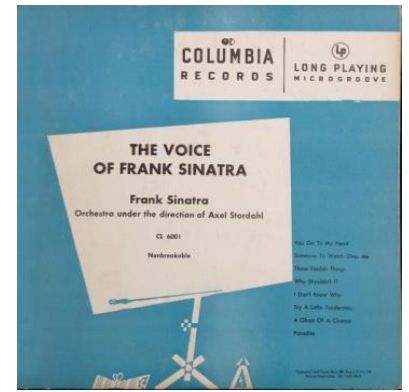
Other labels from 1948-49 have "long playing" and "microgroove" on one line, with the LP logo in the middle. Underneath these words is a single line of rim text.
