In the pop album department, the firm will release a total of seven albums, including the first package by Frank Sinatra tagged "Songs for Young Lovers," most of which are standards.

FRANK SINATRA

Songs for Young Lovers—Capitol H 488— An outstanding job by Sinatra, who chants a tuneful set of standards with consummate ease and smoothness. Tasteful backing by Nelson Riddle helps make "he disk a listening treat. Should be a money-earner.

In May, 1955, this album was combined with the ten-inch album, *Swing Easy*, to form the twelve-inch record with catalog number W-587. That album has its own page in this series.

In July 1962, after Frank Sinatra left Capitol Records for Reprise, Capitol reissued his album catalog. The original album was reissued with four additional tracks as album W-1432.

Capitol eventually reduced the price from the higher-priced SW- line to the standard ST- line.

From March, 1971, to about 1978, Capitol issued *Songs for Young Lovers* under the title *My One and Only Love*. With that name it was released separately as DF-725 and was paired with a reissue of another Sinatra album as STBB-724. This time Capitol withdrew two songs from the set – leaving ten songs.

In 1980, Capitol reissued the album again onto its N- series budget line with the ten-song lineup. For this pressing the alterate title remained: *My One and Only Love*.
