

Observe that the producer credits each read "John & Yoko," indicating that this pairing was prepared first. Since Apple-UK was marketing the single as a double A-side, it might be the case that Apple-US wanted to hold the song back for a second single, which might have been assigned the unused number of 1860. Others claim that the side was merely too long for consideration as a single track in America. Still others say that Capitol may have been worried about controversy; this explanation seems unlikely given that they had put "F is Not a Dirty Word" (David Peel) out as a promotional single earlier that year. However, without access to Capitol's paperwork on the single, we may not know the answer. Neither trade ads nor reviews mention the B-side, but it is likely that the first B-side was withdrawn early in the preparation process.

Picture Sleeve: All known copies have a round cut with the side having the address at the bottom being the open side.

The trade ad below indicates that the persons in charge of the ad corrected a typo in the catalog number, Apple 1859 by opening up the 9 to appear like it might be a 4. The correct number should have looked like Apple 1854.
