### THE RADHA KṚṢṆA TEMPLE

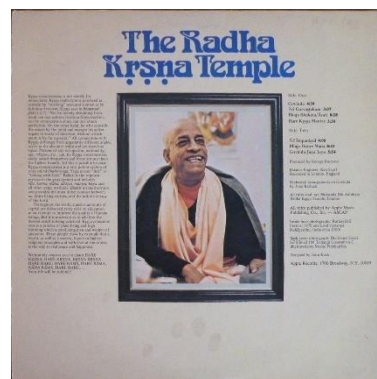

This is an album of mantras that will be most meaningful to people who have embraced Eastern philosophies. For the occidental ear the music might remain monotonous despite George Harrison's unflagging proselytizing. Harrison produced the tinkling album.



### THE RADHA KṚṢṆA TEMPLE—Apple SKAO 3376

Hard to anticipate what kind of reception this will receive but if pure music is any criterion, it should do very well. George Harrison's production of these seven traditional chants is truly exceptional, building both religious texts and instrumental music into huge reverberating tracks that echo and spin almost endlessly. The group's brilliant single, "Govinda" is included and it's a study in production techniques. This is a unique album, not for every listener, but certainly for those curious to explore new musical paths.



### YOUR TRANSCENDENTAL INVITATION

This album, with pictures and full text, produced by George Harrison, is a first recording of pure devotional songs in the ancient spiritual language SANSKRIT. Vibrations of these mantras reveal to the receptive hearer and chanter the realm of KṚṢṆA consciousness, joyfully experienced as a peace of self and awareness of GOD and KṚṢṆA. These eternal sounds of love release the hearer from all contemporary barriers of time and space.

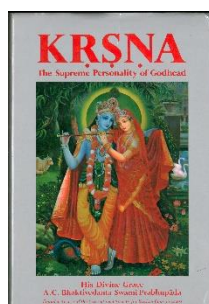
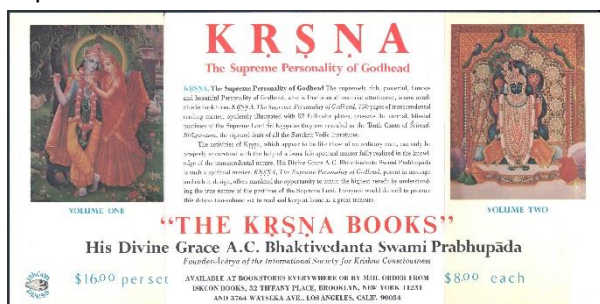
### Front Cover:

John Kosh designed the front cover using a simple photograph that he took at the temple at 7 Bury Place in London. At the temple is a display showing Radha and Krishna; Kosh photographed it in all of its brilliant color.



### Insert:

American copies of the album featured a tri-fold insert promoting the sale of the Kṛṣṇa books by A. C. Bhaktivedanta. George Harrison paid \$19,000 to assist in the publication of the books, and he provided an introduction to them on "Words from Apple" stationery. The books tell the story of Vasudeva Krishna's exploits.



The album sold well for the sort of music contained within, but the national publications did not chart it. Apple released the record on both eight-track cartridge and cassette, but these did not help it sell. It was reissued in Great Britain a few years later as *Goddess of Fortune*. After more reissues in other countries, the album was reissued in the US on Apple (CD) in 1993.
