The timeline for Capitol's work on this album demonstrates how much care they put into it.



The band, produced by Brian, completed their initial work on the record in April-May, 1964, and by May 8th Capitol finalized the track listing. They assigned master numbers 52124 through 52132 to the songs that did not yet have them and went to work creating album mothers and stampers, labels, and a cover. According to their paperwork they projected a release date of July 1st.


They had already selected "I Get Around" as a leadoff single, which they released at this point – with an official release date of May 11th. The art department was probably working on cover designs at this time, as printers were getting label copy ready. Someone with decision-making authority heard the song "Our Favorite Recording Sessions" and mulled over whether to include a three-minute edit of bits of recording session warm-ups and chatter.

Meanwhile on May 19th, Capitol authorized the designs of the original front cover slicks for reproduction by the printers. These slicks included a misspelling of "Don't Back Down" as "Don't Break Down," but Capitol did not catch it at the time. Had the album come out in its original form, it would have contained the 3:06 version of "Our Favorite Recording Sessions," as this label (courtesy of Chris Woods) indicates. However, in late May and early June Capitol made acetates of the album – some of these apparently excluding the track entirely.



On June 10th, having compared the versions of the album with and without the disputed track, Capitol chose to eliminate it from the LP. A&R man Karl Engemann issued a memo to that effect and officially ordered the removal. The following day, Capitol prepared back liners without the song and directed that new labels be printed. [Again thanks to Chris.]





At this point, Capitol gave *All Summer Long* a green light for production, and they ordered the plants to begin pressing records. However, apparently Brian Wilson intervened – producing for the label an edited version of "Our Favorite Recording Sessions" that was only 2:00 in length. Capitol agreed to the compromise and on June 15th Ray Polley sent a note to Bill Matthias at the Scranton plant telling him not to destroy the original set of album liners – the ones that showed the song. Capitol had decided to use the song after all, and therefore the original set from 5/19 was okay to use.

On June 16th Polley ordered the pressing plants to "Discontinue pressing records and scrap all records on hand. Scrap lacquers and all parts on:

T-2, D-1, D-2, D-3, D-4, D-5, and D-6

ST-1, D-1, D-2, and D-3

ST-2, D-1, D-2, D-3, D-4, D-5, and D-6."

"Send new corrected lacquers to both plants. These can be identified as final correction with any T-2 dub number above D-6...."


"Send new corrected label copy on side 2 to both plants. This can be identified as final correction by the issuance date of 15JUN64."

Polley ordered all earlier side-two labels to be scrapped, along with covers printed without the song. Finally, he directed the plants to start production again as soon as they received the new parts.

For this reason no copies of the album are known to exist with low-numbered stampers. However, they still weren't done. In early July someone noticed the spelling error on the front cover, and on the 6th Polley ordered the use of a new black layer with the corrected spelling for "Don't Back Down." All of this activity delayed the album's release considerably, and it had not come out on July 1st but probably two weeks later.



Capitol had taken out an ad for the July 11th issue of *Cash Box*, showing the album as available, but it wasn't quite ready yet. *Cash Box* usually reviewed albums the week before *Billboard* did; that was the case here. CB's review was in the July 18th issue, and it appeared a week later in *Billboard*. The album debuted in *Cash Box* in the issue of 7/25, so it was probably in the shops the week before. It debuted in *Billboard* on August 1st at #101, then jumped to #13 on August 8th – proving to be a big hit.

On Label M01L(i), side 1 has the song titles indented (like earlier Capitol LPs) so that the 1 that precedes "I Get Around" is under the E in "THE", and the (in the matrix number is over the 1 in 2:10. On side 2 there is not much space between the matrix number and the first song title.

On Label M01L(ii), side 1 has the song titles indented so that the 1 that precedes "I Get Around" is under the E in "THE", and the (in the matrix number is over the: in 2:10. On side 2 there is more space under

the matrix number, and the song titles are further to the left.

On Label M01L(iii), side 1 has the 1 that precedes "I Get Around" is under the T in "THE", and the (in the matrix number is over the 1 in 2:10. On side 2 the 1 that precedes "Wendy" is under the TH in "THE.

Label M01L(iv) may be an unmatched side two. It has much more space between the title and artist name than the others.

Billboard observed the record climb to the #4 spot, behind Dean Martin's Everybody Loves Somebody (#3) and two Beatles albums. Cash Box agreed to the record's stellar status.

The side-one labels of Label S01L(i) have the (in front of the matrix number over the 2 in 2:10. There is approximately one blank line of space between the matrix number and the first song. There is less than one blank line between the album title and artist name.

The side-one labels of Label S01L(ii) have the (in front of the matrix number over the 2 in 2:10. There are approximately 1.5 blank lines of space between the matrix number and the first song. There is more than one blank line between the album title and artist name.

The side-one labels of Label S01L(iii) have the (in front of the matrix number over the colon in 2:10.

In 1969, Capitol prepared the combined album The Beach Boys *Close Up* (Capitol SWBB-253). This contained both *Surfin' USA* and *All Summer Long*. The labels list 3:06 as the time for "Our Favorite Recording Sessions. At that point the album went out of print temporarily, but in 1970 *Close Up* was deleted from the catalog, and *All Summer Long* was reinstated as a budget-series album with a new catalog number. The budget album lacked "Carl's Big Chance" and "Our Favorite Recording Sessions."
