Special Promotions, 1971-72

In the heat of summer 1971, Ron Warix was working for a wholesaler in the eastern USA. They were, in his words, "a large oldies outlet and jukebox operator." Warix had a good relationship with Capitol Records and placed an order for a special pressing of a single for WTLC in Indianpolis — a station best known as a soul powerhouse with African-American ownership.

At about the same time or shortly thereafter, Warix ordered a group of back catalog singles from Capitol's Special Markets division. With one exception, these were all out-of-print American Capitol singles. Warix selected the titles himself, and in the case of one Beatles single, he actually sent them a copy of the single so they would have the label copy. Capitol's Jacksonville plant pressed up 1000 copies of each single, but Capitol balked at the fact that there were three Beatles singles in the group. Warix says that the Beatles singles were cancelled, but all three of them seem to have gotten out in fairly large quantities. Based on an ad in *Billboard*, the special reissue singles may have been available during the first few months of 1972.







In the group of singles came this US Capitol pressing of a single that was a hit in Canada in 1964, and which received airplay from radio stations in the United States. Capitol did not press this single *by mistake*; instead, it was briefly available as part of a set that Sound Classics released in conjunction with Capitol's Special Products division. Mr. Warix believes that 300 to 500 copies of each of the Beatles singles got out before Capitol stopped their release.
