Clarion Records Albums June 1965

In June 1965, Atlantic Records announced the rollout of a budget line called Clarion Records. Their stated plan was to release twenty-one albums in June, ten (or more) albums in August, and then a new batch of releases every other month. What actually happened, though, was that Clarion released its first twentyone albums, but no others ever followed. The majority of the albums proved to be unpopular – even at budget prices. Most of these were reissues of earlier Atlantic/Atco material, and some were reissues of albums that Clarion licensed from other labels. These reissues contained fewer songs than their original releases. The albums that were not reissues were compilation albums with material from past Atlantic releases.

Atlantic Bows Low-Priced Clarion Line

NEW YORK-Atlantic has announced the formation of a new low-priced line which will be known as Clarion Recwhich will be known as Clarion Kec-ords. First release on the new label will consist of 21 albums. The label nas already started shipping the prod-uct to distributors throughout the country. Featured in this initial re-

country. Featured in this initial re-lease are such well-known artists as the Beatles, Bobby Darin, the Drift-ers, Ben E. King the Montevideo Singing Strings, the Coasters, Chris Connor, Errol Garner, etc. Suggested retail hist price for Clarion is \$1.98 for both mono and stereo. Executives of the new label are Ahmet Ertegun, Jerry Wexler, Nesuhi Ertegun and Milt Ross. Ross, a vet-eran executive in the budget disk field, is the executive vice-president and general manager of Clarion Rec-ords. For the past five years he has been in charge of Premier Records, a been in charge of Premier Records, a leading budget label that he founded in 1959. Ross will spearhead liaison with rack-jobbers in addition to his

other executive functions for Clarion. Len Sachs and Bob Kornheiser will be in charge of distrib sales. be in charge of distrib sales. Atthough a low-priced line, Clarion LP's will feature four-color covers, jackets with spines and attractive labels. They are all polyskin wrapped, for convenience in handling and to protect them in racks and record

protect them in racks and record stores. Enthusiasm on the part of distribs and rack-jobbers for the initial Cla-rion release have run so high that ad-vance orders reportedly total 250,000 units prior to release. There will be an intensive promotional and adver-tising campaign to acquain the con-sumer with the new line er with the new line. full quota of distributors has sumer

ready been appointed to handle the Clarion line. The records will be sold through distribs and rack jobbers. New Clarion releases are scheduled for every other month. The next re-lease, due in Aug., will consist of a minimum of 10 albums.

Clarion kept printing costs down by using only two back cover blanks: one picturing the cover of The Amazing Beatles (Clarion 601), and the other using a British flag design in place of the cover to that LP. On top of these blanks were printed one of the following things:



Atl. Debuts **Budget Line;** 21 LP's Out


NEW YORK-Atlantic Records has debuted a budget line under the label Clarion Records. Initial release of 21 albums is already under shipment to distributors.

Artists featured on the new label, list priced at \$1.98 for both mono and stereo, include the Beatles, Ben E. King, Erroll Garner, Bobby Darin, Solomon Burke, the Coasters and the Drifters. Label executives are Ahmet Ertegun, Jerry Wexler Nesuhi Ertegun and Milt Ross Wexler, Ross, executive vice-president and general manager of Clarion. will also spearhead liaison with jobbers. Len Sachs and rack Bob Kornheiser are in charge of distributor sales.

Advance orders for the new label already total 250,000 units. An intensive promotion will support the label's launching. The records will be sold both through distributors and rack jobbers. The next release in August will consist of at least 10 albums; other releases are planned every other month.


