RCA KO's Tradition -Bows Outside Label

NEW YORK — RCA Victor has tied in with Columbia Pictures and Screen Gems on the formation of a new record label known as Colgems. It's an unprecedented move on Victor's part. This marks the first time it has gone beyond its disk company structure to establish a new disk entity.

Coming into the Colgems deal will be Don Kirshner, head of the Columbia Pictures-Screen Gems Television Music Division. He will serve as creative director. The deal calls for Columbia-Screen Gems to create and develop the new product and for RCA Victor to manufacture and merchandise that product.

It's been reported that the Victor tie-up with Columbia-Screen Gems will kick off with a disk by a new group, the Monkees. The group will star

on a Screen Gems TV series which will premiere this fall. The disk's release is scheduled to precede the TV show's kick-off.

Kirschner indicated that he expects to draw from every area of music for the product to be released on the Colgems label. In addition to TV, he says he'll draw from the music of Broadway and motion pictures, as well as the contemporary sound for the teen market.

NEW YORK — TV and movies will play an increasingly important part in the activities of Screen Gems-Columbia Music and its sister company, Colgens Records. Now that the transition period is over in the change of command from Don Kirshner, who headed both companies until three months ago, to Emil LaViola, who now reigns over the Screen Gems-Columbia Music setup, and Lester Sill, who's in charge of Colgens, the blueprint has been set for closer working ties on the publishing and record company

levels with Screen Gems-TV and Columbia Pictures, their parent companies.

The first major push will be on the TV end with a tie-up patterned after the campaign which launched the Monkees for them last year. The drive will be pegged on Sally Field, who plays the title role in the Screen Gems series "The Flying Nun," which premieres on ABC-TV this fall. Miss Field's first Colgems single is due in mid-August and an album is now in the works. RCA Victor, which manufactures and distributes

the Colgems product, will st start rolling out its promotio and advertising guns on M Field's behalf. Miss Field, w starred several seasons ago the "Gidget" TV series, will making her disk debut on Cogems.








"Last Train to Clarksville" b/w "Take A Giant Step," for this week. The selections were written by Tommy Boyce-Bobby Hart and Carole King-Gerry Goffin, respectively. Both teams are exclusive writers for the Screen Gems-Columbia Music Publishing Company.

At this point in the Monkees' career, Mike Nesmith in particular was most keen on the band gaining more creative freedom: recording their own music; choosing what to record; and choosing what to release. However, by contract, Don Kirshner had the authority to select the songs that he thought were hits, to release as singles. Mike wanted one of his own songs, "The Girl I Knew Somewhere," to be the group's next single, and he handpicked a new producer to work on it. Kirshner disapproved of Mike's choice. He picked "A Little Bit Me, a Little Bit You," written by Neil Diamond and sung by Davy to the band's next A-side. For the B-side, he chose "She Hangs Out," which Davy also sang. This coupling was announced in the 2/25/67 issue of New Musical Express. Colgems wanted what Kirshner called "a greater share of the royalties" from Monkees records; they sided with Nesmith and fired Kirshner. He sued them, they sued him, and Colgems wound up paying an undisclosed (large) sum to Kirshner to go away quietly. Meanwhile, the Monkees single was withdrawn in the United States, being released only in Canada.

Reports that Kirshner had angered divided the band by issuing a promo single in March promoting Davy Jones as his favorite are untrue. There was a promo single, but it was released in May, and not by Colgems. Davy started his own, short-lived, label in March. Along with Davy Jones Records, he founded Syncro Music and Jon-Jon management. Some copies of the first Davy Jones single (#661) came out on the Syncro label, as Davy was setting up his own design. The matrix information in the promo singles indicates that they were made in May in association with a fan campaign called "Why Davy Jones is My Favorite Monkee." Given the track selection, one is led to believe that Davy's friend, Don Kirshner, helped pick the tracks.
