

Monkees Set A U.S. Tour

NEW YORK — The Monkees are preparing a concert tour of the U. S. for early spring. The tour will follow a cross-country promotion junket which the Monkees are lining up on behalf of their new Colgems single, "Tear Drop City" b/w "A Man Without a Dream" and their forthcoming album, "Instant Replay." In addition, NBC-TV is scheduling the Monkees' recently taped special, "33½ Revolutions Per Monkee," during the present TV season.

While Davy Jones, Micky Dolenz and Mike Nesmith will continue to record and appear

continue to record and appear in concert together as the Mon-kees, the fourth member, Peter Tork, is leaving to perform as a single.

Picture Sleeve:

At some point in 1968, artist/friend Neko Chohlis had drawn promotional images of the four Monkees. When Colgems decided to use his art to promote the single sleeve, he put some of the images together and overlaid color bars. Since this was at the time when Peter Tork was in the process of leaving the group, Colgems clipped off the photograph of Peter and replaced it with a simple bar of color.







Picture Sleeve:

The first picture sleeves (PS1) feature "Someday Man" on top on both sides.

The second sleeve (PS2) have "Listen to the Band" hastily replaced as the top side on one side of the sleeve. On these copies, "Listen to the Band" is in a smaller typeface than on PS3.

The third sleeve (PS3) shows "Listen to the Band" on top on both sides – the public having considered it to be the stronger song.

The Indianpolis pressing plant introduced Label 70 with this record. However, the Rockaway pressing plant continued to use Label 69. This was the first Colgems single for which the original pressing used a different backdrop for each of the three RCA Victor pressing plants — a matter that continued through the last Colgems single. The introduction of Label 70 in September 1969 seems to have marked a widening separation between Columbia Pictures/Screen Gems and Colgems Records.

All three trade magazines treated "Mommy and Daddy" as the A-side, although the promotional singles did not mark either side as the "Plug Side." The ad from Colgems, however, appears to promote "Good Clean Fun" over "Mommy and Daddy." The two sides fared somewhat equally well at first, although "Good Clean Fun" was slightly ahead. In later weeks, "Mommy and Daddy" was still getting airplay in some markets. By that time, the trade magazines had stopped charting A- and B-sides separately.





Although its only appearance in the trades was in 1971, the single more likely came out in August or September, 1970, when the Getting Straight film was receiving last-ditch promotion. At the end of June 1970, Bell Records (part of Columbia Pictures) announced their association with the new Partridge Family TV series. The *Oliver* soundtrack was still selling, and RCA moved it into their Red Seal series. Fall saw no new releases from Colgems, who wrapped up their activities and concluded with a second hits collection from the Monkees in January 1971.
