Fantasy Records

Fantasy Records rolled out its 3-200 series of twelve-inch LPs in earnest in late fall, 1955. Although the first album, released in April, had been on green vinyl, from that point on the albums sporting red labels were also to be released on red vinyl. At least beginning in 1956, black vinyl was an option.

The cover construction on the earliest records appears to have been configured so that the color front-cover slick was larger, and was folded around to the back. On top of that was glued a smaller back-cover slick in black-and-white. Many releases before the change in prefix at the end of the year also exist in covers with the reverse configuration: a smaller color front cover is glued onto a larger black-and-white slick that wraps around to the front.



In some cases it is certainly clear that the covers with larger front slicks are harder to find; however, it is not so simple to identify either pressing as a "reissue." It might be the case that Fantasy ordered their covers from more than one packaging company, and that the companies constructed their covers differently. So far collectors have not made any label or cover variations out to be more valuable than the others.





Red Rodney is a trumpet player now making headquarters in the Windy City. His work in the past with Woody Herman, Charlie Ventura and others is well known, here he is spotlighted in a group of talented Chicago instrumentalists, that includes Roy Haynes on drums, Ira Sullivan on tenor sax, Victor Sproles on bass and Norm Simmons on piano. Rodney has a warm, engaging style, which is modern but not in the least forbidding. His solos are thrilling virtuoso displays, yet are always carefully integrated with this driving ensemble. "The Song Is You" would be a good demonstration band.

The Brothers Sandole—Dennis and Adolph—are composers hailing from Philadelphia. Ensemble here is unusually well equipped to play a program of their advanced compositions. Far out, as most of the program is, its appeal is not exclusively intellectual. Altoist John LaPorta's tender solo in "Way Down," for example, is accessible to tutored and untutored ears alike. Art Farmer's bright, perky trumpet work is also outstanding. Other members of the group are: Teo Macero, George Barrow, Sonny Russo, Al Del Governatore, Wendell Marshall, Milt Hinton and Clem De Rosa.

To a large part of the public, Tjader's popular success with his Mambo Quintet has obscured the fact that he is a Jazz man pure and simple, and that his Latin-American stylings represent only one side of his musical development. This LP showcase the "other" Tjader—and along with him, some San Francisco musicians that also deserve wider publicity: particularly, trombonist Bob Collins, tenor man Brew Moore and guitarist Eddis Duran. Theirs is a relaxed, lyric, quietly purposeful Jazz that would appeal to a wide cross-section of jazz customers. Tjader's work on ballads like "There Will Never Be Another You" is especially ingratiating.

Miss Reed is quite a talent. In her first important disking, the singer who cut her eye teeth in Chicago bistros shows an infinitely gracious touch on a very smart line-up of material. The gal has great respect for a melody, does little tampering and yet she has a wonderful way of handling each tune all by itself giving it a special meaning that hits the bullseye fast. A sampling would be "My Time of Day," "Little Girl Blue," "My Love Is a Wanderer" and "Because We're Kids." Gal has plenty on the ball and will bear watching. Unfortunately, the album cover does nothing to sell the package.


Brew Moore, young tenor man active on the San Francisco scene, says of his current work, "My main idea is to get back to simplicity. The biggest kick to me in playing is swinging-freedom and movement." This is apparent in this album, cut earlier this year, using personnel that has been associated with Moore most of '55 and '56 in San Francisco. Moore's approach is quiet and unpretentious, very listenable in blues and ballads (examples: "Them Old Blues" and "Fools Rush In"). On up-tempo material, his reticence and unaggressiveness are liabilities. Here is a relaxed and honest musician, however, that merits careful watching. Moderate sales to modern collectors.

Desmond's pure, silvery tones are heard against the velvety background of Don Elliott's mellophone (except for several numbers where he plays trumpet). In this new context, Desmond's horn gives some unexpected new kicks. In "Sacre Blues," for example, he is uninhibited enough to make it certain he had left his charcoal grey suit home. Elliott is relaxed and swinging. Rhythm is only perfunctory, however. The LP ought to sell to all Brubeckians plus some who will be glad to find something new added (or taken away). "Primitive modern" art work on cover will pop the customers' eyes out.
