

The series will be released na-tionally by Okum under the Hush-Hush label.









The first cover does not indicate that this is volume one. Beginning later in 1954, Jubilee added "Vol. 1" to the front cover, where it appears in a rectangular box.





The Salt City Five is an unusually bright and clean-cut Dixieland outfit. Formed three years ago in Syracuse under the leadership of trombonist Will Alger, the group combines youthful gusto and the technique that comes only from experience. Their playing has enormous drive but without any sense of pushing. They're a steady and consistent group, well balanced, with Alger's tailgate-cum-Teagarden trombone laying a solid foundation. Their spirited performances make this disk one of the most exhilerating Dixieland collections released in a long time.



Hall McKusick on the alto and clarinet; Billy Byers doubling at arranging and the trombone; and the vocal stylings of Betty St. Claire. Betty, who worked with Dizzy Gilespie and Howard McGhee is heard on wax for the first time. The gal has an easy-to-listen-to pair of chords and an utterly relaxing style. In fact the entire motif of the LP is music modern but soft. It retains melody while also keeping in the progressive groove.





Fiske recorded the album for the Derby label in 1953, but Derby's financial struggles prevented them from releasing it. After the company's bankruptcy, the Derby masters went up for sale near the end of 1954. Jubilee purchased and released the Fiske LP.






Jubilee LP-18 **Bob Peck** Songs that Never Made the Hymnal

Derby Hearing Set Nov. 9; Oberstein Bids for Catalog

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—A hearing to consider bids for the title and interest in the catalog and masters of defunct Derby Records is scheduled to come before Referee Irwin Kurtz at U. S. Court House, Room 102, at 11:30 a.m., November 9. The diskery, which was headed by Larry Newton, fiied a bankruptcy petition in the Southern District Court of New York on October 14, listing liabilities of \$213,090 and assets of \$18,935.



Eli Oberstein, head of the Record Corporation of America, is understood to have offered \$3,500, but was subsequently reported to have upped his figure. Schneider says offers in addition to Oberstein's have already been received.

Before Derby's masters can be sold, the bids must represent 75 per cent of the appraised value. Ben Selvin, RCA Victor record exec appointed by the court to appraise the stock, says there are 286 released masters and 160 unreleased. Talent on the masters includes Sunny Gale, Jaye P. Morgan, Trudy Richards, Neal Hefti, Johnny Richards, Eddie Wilcox, Dwight Fiske, Bob Carroll, Bob Dini and Jimmy Leyden.

On November 8, one day prior to the hearing, an auction sale of furniture, fixtures and record inventory will occur at the premises or Derby Records. Selvin estimates this stock includes approximately 10,000 disks, both 78's and 45's, including EP's.













In summer 1955, Jubilee terminated the original ten-inch album series. They deleted some of the records from the catalog at the time, and the others they reissued into the new LP-2000 series.
