## Introduction

Mercury Records began in 1945 as a small label with pressing plants in Saint Louis and Chicago, immediately boasting that they were capable of producing records rapidly. That boast became a promise, as Mercury's singles took off in popularity – leading to the release of albums.

Mercury's figurehead was an image of the Roman deity, at first drawn in profile. By May, 1946, the company had switched to a younger, friendlier image of Mercury and was looking for someone to represent the company. They found Eddie Gaedel, a young

Mercury's "10 Series" of albums began with a mixture of different styles. The companies different lines allowed them to grow while other small labels were not flourishing. This attracted the attention of several artists and producers, including Norman Granz – a big name in jazz. Granz had released several volumes of *Jazz at the Philharmonic* which were widely acclaimed. During 1948, the year of the union ban, Mercury and Granz came to an agreement allowing his Clef discs to be issued by Mercury and drawing Granz into the Mercury stable of artists. #### Mercury's Little Man Comes to Life; A Disk-Biz'Johnny'

CHICAGO, June 1.-Newest promotional stunt in the record field is take-off on Philip Morris's Johnny gimmick. Mercury Records has hired a "Mercury Man," a three-foot, seven-inch midget. Twenty-year-old Mercury mar's real name is Eddie Gaedel and he will be used primarily to contact disk jockeys, autograph Mercury disks at department and retail stores when they are released, put in appearances at Mercury distributors thruout the country, and appear at places where Mercury attractions are being featured.

Much of Mercury's future promotion will be tied around Mercury Man, and a contest will be held flru record stores and counters to give him a sumame. Idle-sized cutis are being made and will be placed on display above contents thrunch thadows and abow contents thrunch thadows not the Mercury Man is garbed in an aluminum-winged helmet, winged boots, red cape and trousers.

Mercury exces here added that he will be used as a central character in a series of kid albums also. Mercury Man bowed here in his promotional role by giving away 150 records nilely at College Inn nitery, where Buddy Rich is currently appearing.

Mercury began releasing classical records in the LP format in February, 1949, and by July they had over 40 LPs on the market. Shortly after Mercury went into LPs they started releasing 45 RPM discs; these listings contain albums that were released before the advent of the other two speeds.

NORMAN GRANZ-JAZZ AT THE PHIL-HAMMONIC-Vol. 4 (Disc 504) It's another listen in on a Norman Granz jazz concert, with the wax cretaining the enthusiasm of the concert audience. And for the listener enthusiasm runs highest for a lively Blues that spreads over three sides the sorcery of Shorty Nadime at the piano, who interweaves the blues theme with Les Paul's stellar guit' pickings. There's also musical meat the improvisings of saxers Jack McVea and Illinois Jacquet along with the trombone slides of J. J. Johnson. For the remaining three sides the jazz aces ride it furiously for *Lester Leaps*. An impressionistic cover, shadowing instruments and playing fingers, makes for an attractive album design.

These albums were previously distributed on Granz's short-lived Clef label. Mercury has purchased a set of eight masters from Wisconsin polka orkster Samm Madden, which were returned to him when Chord label Prexy Mike Cudahy went to the Coast recently to join Perfection Plastics, a pressery. In addition, Mercury has purchased masters made privately before the ban by Florida radio hillbillies Peewee Jenkins and His Barn Dance Buddies and Daisy Mae and Old Brother Charlie.
