

In early September, 1971, National Periodical Publications – the owners of the Superman trademark – announced that they were suing Shelter Records over the unauthorized use of Supie's logo. Capitol responded by immediately "blacking out" the logo on all of the new printed labels.

A few (rare) covers showing the SW-8903 prefix have NO Shelter logo. These copies were transitional to the new logo. Within two months, Shelter had created a new "S" logo (in an egg) that didn't look anything like Superman's.





In late January 1974, the industry scuttlebutt ran with the information that Shelter Records would soon be moving away from Capitol and to MCA Records. That turned out to be true, and the Shelter back catalog soon found its way to MCA.

The album remained on Shelter/ABC for just over two years. During that time, they changed the backdrop to make it more interesting.

The album remained on Shelter/ABC for just over two years. At the end of January 1979, ABC sold out to MCA. This pushed the Shelter catalog back onto the MCA label. At some point during '79, using covers that had been printed for ABC, MCA reissued the Shelter line onto its MCA Coral budget label.

Less than a year later, MCA stopped using the Coral label for its Shelter reissues and put them out on the main MCA line, with the same catalog number.

At the beginning of 1981, MCA absorbed Shelter, meaning that there would be no more new releases using the brand.

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
