On a **Gloversville**, New York, pressing, the side number (1 or 2) is always quite a bit larger than the word SIDE, and the numeral itself is centered on the line that contains the word SIDE, so that it extends above and below that line.



On a **Pinckneyville**, Illinois, pressing, the side number (1 or 2) is only slightly larger than the word SIDE, and the numeral itself is positioned so that the top of the numeral is at approximately the same height as the top of the word SIDE.
